



## Class 8 Musings about their Camp

## ACTIVATING HUMAN RIGHTS AND PEACE CONFERENCE

From the 1st to the 4th of July, we (Kaya and Malika) attended the 'Activating Human Rights and Peace Conference' as student representatives for CBRSS. We were given this inspiring opportunity by an associate of the Southern Cross University who sponsored students from the Byron Shire Region to attend the Conference.

The conference consisted of talks, presentations and panel sessions from professors to activists, from politicians to aid workers and lasted approximately 10 hours a day.

It was an eye-opening experience and provided us with knowledge and insight into many mainstream and diverse human rights and peace related topics.

We attended the full four days and were particularly moved by such speakers as Ilana Meallem, Mutassim Abu El Hawa, Anna Seymour, Adrien Wing, Judy Atkinson and Wendell Rosevear.

Meallem and El Hawa are from the Arava Institute for Environmental Studies in Jordan and spoke about solving environmental issues while encouraging alliances between the many countries of the Middle East. Ilana is a practicing Jew, while Mutassim is a Palestinian Arab, making their friendship particularly profound.

Adrien Wind is an African-American professor and politician from Iowa and gave a thought provoking speech on the current US elections and the role of Obama – she focused on the different consequences concerning gender, race and human rights in American politics.

Wendell Rosevear is a councillor and social worker, particularly in Australian prisons; his presentation entitled 'Fair Go Mate' was fascinating, as his views on human nature and the psyche were sensitive and intuitive. Wendell works with people to overcome situations of abuse and helps them to work through their struggles in a safe and sensitive environment.

It was great to see so many presenters acknowledge the traditional Arakwal land on which the Conference was held and the traditional Aboriginal dancers with which the Conference was opened.

Many foreign visitors expressed their respect for the tribute continuously paid to the Indigenous people of Australia.

We'd like to thank Southern Cross University for hosting such a brilliant Conference and thank our school for giving us the chance to experience this truly inspiring event.
